

#### a. Child Protection:

National Development Foundation works and collaborates with various Government and non-government stakeholders in creating a protective environment for children free from all forms of violence, abuse, exploitation, and neglect; strengthening community-based child protection mechanisms through effective implementation of child protection policies, legislation, services, and schemes; advocating and influencing legal and policy reforms in line with Global Conventions on the Rights of the Child ratified by Govt. of India in the state of J&K; and utilising a child rights programming framework keeping in mind the cross-cutting themes of child participation, non-discrimination and best interest of children while working with and for children for the realisation of their Rights.

We are strengthening health systems and nutrition services for all children and women, effectively implementing health/medical schemes, preventing child marriage and reducing adolescent pregnancies, and providing infrastructure and health services to improve the health status of communities.





#### **b. Education:**

National Development Foundation, NDF collaborate with various Government and non-governmental stakeholders and works towards ensuring every child, especially the most marginalised those in greater danger of being left behind like girls and children with disabilities, enjoy their right to equitable and quality Education from early learning opportunities to secondary Education so that they reach their full potential; work for effective implementation of education policies, legislations, schemes and services; strengthening policy and legal reforms in line with the right to Education and providing infrastructure to improve education services.

#### c. Water Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH):

National Development Foundation, NDF aims to improve general public health and transform the lives of communities by improving their access to safe Water, sanitation and hygiene; work and build partnerships with Government and nongovernmental stakeholders to empower and enable communities to demonstrate sustainable WASH solutions to influence policy; improve access to water supply by leveraging government resources; construct toilets to stop open defecation for universal toilet use at households, school, institutions, and public places; improve hygiene practices by promoting knowledge and motivating change on main hygiene behaviours; strengthening linkages between government WASH facilities/schemes and communities, and promote safe waste management and disposal.



#### d. Youth Empowerment and Skill Development:

National Development Foundation, NDF aims at creating a pool of young and independent people from a section of eligible and underprivileged youth and women through skill upgradation and livelihoods in accordance with market requirements to aid economic growth; skill up-gradation through vocational training of deserving and most marginalised youth and women; Gender equity and women empowerment; development and empowerment of youth and adolescents by utilising their limitless energies and potential through, Camping, Leadership programmes, Sports, cultural, literary and other youth activities which can inculcate among them a sense of patriotism, selfless service, the dignity of labour, fraternity, brotherhood and overall discipline in a broader sense.







#### e. DRR and Emergency Response:

National Development Foundation, NDF aims to build resilience and reduce the vulnerability of communities, especially children, youth, and women, by improving community preparedness for emergencies.

In the aftermath of natural disasters; work and collaborate with Government and non-governmental stakeholders to reach out to the most marginalised needy families affected by natural disasters to respond to their immediate essential needs and long-term rehabilitation; to promote and build leadership among children, youth, and women through community-based approaches enabling them to participate in the decision making process to respond effectively to humanitarian crises; and provide child-friendly spaces to cater to the children's psychological, nutritional, medical and protection needs.







#### **Nature, Wildlife and Climate Change**

#### a) Himalayan Wildlife and Environment Protection:

National Development Foundation, NDF aims to work with a wide range of stakeholders to conserve and protect Himalayan Wildlife and critical ecosystems for continued social, economic and environmental benefits. This programme of NDF focuses on environmental protection, conservation and awarenessbuilding partnerships with Government, research institutions, educational institutions and civil society organisations. NDF aims to effective implementation of environment & wildlife-related policies & legislation. To achieve the overall objectives of nature and wildlife conservation, we aim to work closely with communities, several leading scientists, conservationists, educators and experts from varied professional backgrounds with a passion for the conservation of nature and natural resources. As part of this programme, the focal area of our work will be Northern India in general and the Western Himalayas in particular. Ecotourism initiatives in natural areas and key wildlife habitats will be promoted as means for nature conservation and for providing alternate sources of livelihood.

#### b) Climate Mitigation and Adaptation:

National Development Foundation, NDF aims to focus on various climate mitigation and adaptation strategies for reducing the impacts of climate change. This will be achieved by organising focused awareness programmes on different latest climate adaptation and mitigation strategies for Himalayan communities, through watershed development and tree planting drives and by promoting environmentally sustainable practices. Demonstration of environment-friendly pilot projects and policy and advocacy with the Government for strengthening environmental policy and frameworks will be key areas of our work. The main Focus of the climate adaptation and mitigation programme of NDF is creating awarenessamong a wide range of stakeholders about conserving nature and natural resources in their immediate vicinity. Healthy natural ecosystems will be promoted as a natural solution to deal with Climate Change at a regional level. Sustainable agricultural practices will also be promoted as a likely climate adaptation and mitigation strategy.



#### c) Water and Wetlands:

National Development Foundation, NDF aims to document wetlands and wetland biodiversity of Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh through on-the-ground research and citizen science initiatives. To achieve this, NDF will focus on developing strategies for conserving protected areas, especially National Parks, Wildlife Sanctuaries, and Wetland Conservation Reserves of Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh. The programme will also focus on developing an alternate model for conservation within and outside protected areas. One of the key components of this programme will be biodiversity monitoring and conservation planning. This activity will generate knowledge through applied research and outreach activities. The programme aims to improve the management of biodiversity and ecosystems through various outputs to influence existing policies and conservation planning.


#### d) Snow Leopard Conservation Programme

Snow Leopard Panthera uncia, the smallest member of the genus Panthera is the most elusive cat inhabiting cold and rugged mountain landscapes of Great and Trans Himalayas in western Himalayas. Its secretive behaviour, camouflage, and adaption to extreme environmental conditions makes it one of the most charismatic species in the world. The snow leopard is found across the high mountains of twelve countries of South and Central Asia and India has the third largest share of snow leopard distributional range. In India, the snow leopard is found in the Union territories of Ladakh, and Jammu & Kashmir, the states of Uttrakhand and Himachal Pradesh in Western Himalayas and the states of Arunachal Pradesh and Sikkim in the Eastern Himalayas. However, currently the species is facing various threats such as habitat loss, poaching and human-wildlife conflict.

Through our snow leopard research and conservation programme, National Development Foundation (NDF) is dedicated to safeguarding the snow leopard population and preserving their unique habitat in the Himalayan landscape.

At NDF, we have embarked on a comprehensive research and conservation initiative with support from the Department of Wildlife Protection, Government of J&K. This programme has a special focus to protect the snow leopard and their fragile habitats. Currently our programme is focusing on following key areas:

- **1. Research:** As part of our research activities for snow leopard, we conduct extensive field research to understand the behaviour, ecology and population dynamics of snow leopards at Kishtwar High Altitude National Park. Through camera trapping, satellite tracking, and genetic analysis, we gather crucial data to inform our conservation strategies.
- **2. Community Engagement:** We recognize the importance of involving local communities in conservation efforts. Therefore NDF community experts work closely with villagers, herders and other stakeholders to raise awareness about the importance of snow leopards and mitigate human-wildlife conflicts through innovative solutions.
- **3. Habitat Protection:** Preserving the snow leopard's habitat is essential for their long-term survival. We collaborate with government agencies and local authorities to implement land-use planning measures and promote sustainable land management practices.
- **4. Capacity Building:** We train local researchers, conservationists and wildlife officials to enhance their skills in snow leopard monitoring, research techniques and community outreach. By empowering local stakeholders, we ensure the sustainability of our conservation efforts.
- **5. Advocacy and Policy:** We advocate for stronger legal protection and policies to safeguard snow leopards and their habitat. Through partnerships with national and international organizations, we strive to influence policy decisions and secure funding for conservation initiatives.

## **Annual Report**

#### **2023-24 Overview**

In 2023-24, the National Development Foundation, on a pilot basis, operationalised a three-tier Community-Based Child Protection Mechanism in district Rajouri as envisioned in Mission Vatsalya and provided mechanisms established under the Juvenile Justice Act.

In the Education sector, NDF worked on strengthening Early Childhood Care and Education, Foundational Literacy & Numeracy, Parent-Teacher engagement, Early Identification of Disabilities and Early Warning Systems for students at risk of dropping out as envisioned in the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020.

The first-ever Research Project of the Kishtwar High Altitude National Park and the key Wildlife Programme, i.e., the Snow Leopard Conservation Programme, gained momentum in 2023-24.







#### **Education**

With the active collaboration of the Government and other stakeholders, the National Development Foundation in 2023-24 implemented various initiatives that promoted equitable excess and gender-responsive Early Childhood Education, facilitating Mainstreaming of Out of School Children, access to quality education and student well-being in our ten targeted schools of Jammu and Samba district: Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE) is an essential part of the educational and developmental landscape in India, and it has been receiving increasing attention in Jammu and Kashmir (J&K) as well. NDF's focus is on providing children with a strong foundation during their formative years, ensuring their holistic development in a child-friendly environment.

#### **Key achievements of ECCE in Jammu and Kashmir**

NDF, in collaboration with the Education Department, organised two workshops on ECCE leadership for Education functionaries to enhance the quality and delivery of early education services, particularly for education officials, administrators, and key stakeholders in the Jammu division. The goal is to equip these functionaries with the knowledge, leadership skills, and tools to effectively implement ECCE programs, monitor progress, and influence positive change in their local contexts.

The Jammu and Kashmir administration has aligned its efforts with national ECCE policies, focusing on implementing programs under:

- National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 emphasises the integration of ECCE into the formal education system.
- Mission Vatsalya to support the holistic development of children under the age of six. The NEP 2020 also envisions pre-primary Education as a key component of formal Education, which has led to plans for enhancing the infrastructure and quality of ECCE services across the region.





#### Key achievements of ECCE in Jammu and Kashmir

- **Strengthen Leadership Skills:** Enhance the leadership capacity of education officials to drive ECCE initiatives in their districts and schools.
- Policy Awareness: Familiarise functionaries with the National Education Policy (NEP)
   2020's ECCE framework and its implementation strategies.
- **Capacity Building:** Develop their understanding of the holistic development needs of children aged 3-6, including cognitive, social, emotional, and physical aspects.
- Innovative Approaches: Introduce best practices and creative approaches to tackle the challenges of delivering ECCE in diverse and complex contexts, such as rural or conflict-affected areas.
- **Community Engagement:** Encourage leadership in community mobilisation and awareness around the importance of early childhood education.
- **Data-Driven Decision Making:** Foster a culture of using data to monitor the implementation of ECCE programs and make informed decisions.

During the workshop, the Director of School Education, Jammu Sh. Ashok Kumar Sharma JKAS, along with President NDF, Sh. Rajiv Khajuria and all other Education officers released the IEC material (information education and communication) regarding the ECCE leadership (Early Childhood Care and Education).

## School Readiness Camps in ten schools of Jammu and Samba District in preparing Children for Formal Schooling

School Readiness Camps are designed to help children transition smoothly from preschool or home environments to formal school settings. These camps run in ten schools i.eGGHS Bazar Qasaban, GMS Upper Paloura, SRML HSS Parade, GMS Chak Changerwan and GHS Muthi, GGMS Bari Brahmana, GHS & GPS Palli, GMS Dollian, GMS Barjani and GHS Meen Sarkar with focus on preparing young children in key developmental areas such as cognitive skills, language, social-emotional development, and physical coordination.

## A total of 956 participants, including 440 adults and 516 children, were sensitised in these camps.

School Readiness Camps are designed to help children transition smoothly from preschool or home environments to formal school settings. These camps run in ten schools i.eGGHS Bazar Qasaban, GMS Upper Paloura, SRML HSS Parade, GMS Chak Changerwan and GHS Muthi, GGMS Bari Brahmana, GHS & GPS Palli, GMS Dollian, GMS Barjani and GHS Meen Sarkar with focus on preparing young children in key developmental areas such as cognitive skills, language, social-emotional development, and physical coordination.



#### **Involving Parents**

- Involving parents in these camps and activities within the camp strengthened the bond between home and school. Parent-teacher engagement and school readiness camps provide a strong foundation for children's transition to formal schooling.
- Through our intervention, we ensure active parental involvement in learning that extends beyond the classroom. Preparation camps prepare children for the physical, cognitive, and emotional challenges of school. Both strategies can significantly improve early learning outcomes and set the stage for lifelong educational success.

A total of 83 teachers (20 male and 63 female) were sensitised on ECCE and Foundational Literacy & Numeracy (FLN) pedagogy during the School Readiness Camps.



#### **Key achievements of FLN in Jammu and Kashmir**

The capacity-building of education officers in foundational literacy and numeracy (FLN) programs aims to improve their skills, knowledge, and effectiveness in supporting educational goals. It is crucial for enhancing the quality of Education, especially in early learning years, where literacy and numeracy form the bedrock of future learning. On August 5th, 2023, NDF organised a workshop on FLN capacity building for education officers. This workshop aimed to:

- Enhance capacity of participants to improve their effectiveness & impact in FLN sector.
- Discuss the importance of FLN skills for children's future learning.
- Share the findings of the FLS study, which highlighted the need for improvement in FLN skills across Jammu & Kashmir.
- Training on how to effectively implement education policies, especially those related to improving literacy and numeracy outcomes in schools.

Around 89 Education officers were sensitised in this workshop, of which 46 were males and 43 were females. During the workshop, The Project Director, Sh. Deep Raj Kanethia, JKAS, Samagra Shiksha, J&K, along with President NDF, Sh. Rajiv Khajuria and all other Education officers released the IEC material (Information Education and Communication) regarding the Capacity building of FLN (Foundational Literacy and Numeracy).



#### **Early Identification Camps**

In collaboration with the Education Department and the Directorate of Health Services Jammu, NDF conducted screening camps for Early Identification of Disabilities in ten schools across Jammu and Samba districts. These camps screened a total of 580 students. The camps followed a three-phase approach:



Phase 1: The NDF team, regular teachers, and special educators assessed students for potential disabilities. 580 students across ten target schools in Jammu & Samba.


Phase 2: A more in-depth evaluation for shortlisted students conducted by special educators. One hundred forty-four students emerged as children for the Second Phase of the screening camp. Out of which, 50 students were shortlisted for the 3rd Phase.

Phase 3: Screening and diagnosis by doctors for students identified in the third Phase. After the second round of screening, 50 students were identified for Phase 3. Out of the 50 students, 14 were referred to the District Early Intervention Centre (DEIC) for specialised intervention. Thirty-seven students received counselling for Speech and language disability or Learning Disability.

By actively involving both teachers and parents, we aimed to create an environment that promotes the overall development and well-being of these identified children.

#### Rollout the Early Warning System for Students at Risk of Dropping Out

National Development Foundation conducted a one-day consultative rollout workshop on an Early Warning system for students at risk of dropout on November 16, 2023, at The Royal Auditorium, Amar Singh Club, Jammu.

Around 100 Education Functionaries were sensitised in this workshop. The workshop mainly focuses on how to implement and strengthen the Early Warning Systems in J&K to prevent dropout rates.

During the workshop, a brief about the Early Warning System (EWS) tool for students at risk of dropping out was discussed, which was the first in Jammu and Kashmir. The resource person, Mr. Ganesh Nigam, briefed the session on how to identify students who are likely to disengage from school and eventually drop out. By using a combination of real-time data and predictive analytics, these systems allow educators and administrators to intervene before a student reaches a crisis point.

Following this rollout workshop, the National Development Foundation (NDF) conducted a one-day teacher training workshop on Early Warning Systems (EWS) for students at risk of dropping out. The workshop involved approximately 20 teachers from ten targeted schools in Jammu and Samba.

The workshop focused on equipping teachers with the tools and strategies to effectively identify and support students at risk of dropping out. The key objectives were to:

- **Enhance understanding of EWS:** Provide teachers with a comprehensive knowledge of EWS concepts, components, and implementation strategies.
- **Identify at-risk students:** Teach teachers how to identify early warning signs through academic, behavioural, and socio-emotional indicators.
- **Develop intervention strategies:** Equip teachers with effective intervention strategies to address the needs of at-risk students.
- Foster collaboration: Promote collaboration among teachers, counsellors, administrators, and parents to ensure coordinated support for students.



#### **Parents Teacher Meeting**

A parent-teacher meeting is an opportunity for parents and teachers to come together and discuss a child's academic progress, behaviour, and any other relevant concerns. It's a valuable time for collaboration to ensure the child receives the best support both at home and at school. NDF, in their current intervention in 2023-24, facilitated 30 parent-teacher meetings in 10 target schools of Jammu and Samba Districts.

A total of 648 Parents (217 male and 431 female) and 120 teachers were present during the parents-teacher meeting.

#### **Child Protection**

The National Development Foundation, with a collaboration of the Government, stakeholders and communities, successfully implemented a pilot programme to strengthen child protection mechanisms in Jammu and Kashmir. Highlights of the project's key achievements and lessons learned are:

The project addressed critical gaps in child protection mechanisms. It built three-tier Child Welfare and Protection Committees at the district, block, and village levels, focusing on capacity building, community engagement, and the establishment of child-friendly spaces.

Training programs for police officers, JJB, CWC, and DCPU officials enhanced their understanding of child rights and protection, leading to improved confidence in delivery services. The formation of Block Level Child Welfare and Protection Committees and village-level child Welfare and Protection Committees fostered community ownership and participation.

#### Key achievements include the following:

Forming/re-invigorating of Child Welfare and Protection Committees (CWPC).

- Training of a range of stakeholders on child welfare and protection.
- Establishing a child-friendly police station.
- Conducting child rights camps and sensitization of about 19,000 community members.
- Facilitating a central government commitment to provide sponsored support for children facing adversity.
- Highlighted the need to address knowledge gaps on alternative care mechanisms and the importance of sustainability through continuous effort.

Despite challenges, including the dissolution of Block Development Councils (BDCs) and Panchayats, the project demonstrated the power of collaborative efforts. The National Development Foundation's expertise, UNICEF Support and government stakeholders' commitment converged to create a lasting impact.



Lessons learned from this project underscore the importance of several key factors in strengthening child protection mechanisms. These are:

- Collaboration is crucial for effective child protection, as it fosters a cohesive approach among stakeholders, ensuring a unified response to child protection issues.
- Capacity building and community engagement are essential, as they empower government officials, police officers, and community members to recognise and address child protection concerns.
- Addressing knowledge gaps on alternative care mechanisms is vital, as it ensures that children receive appropriate care and support.

By integrating these lessons, future initiatives can strengthen child protection systems, ensuring the well-being and dignity of vulnerable children.

**Future Directions:** Building on the project's success, future initiatives should focus on the following:

- Strengthen child protection mechanisms,
- Build capacities,
- Enhance community engagement,
- Create child-friendly spaces,
- Address emerging challenges,
- Scale up successful interventions

#### Capacity building of police officers on child-friendly procedures

Capacity building of police officers on child-friendly procedures is vital for protecting children's rights, safety, and well-being. Effective training enables officers to respond sensitively to child-related cases, minimising trauma and harm and fostering trust and child participation. It addresses the unique needs of child victims, witnesses, and offenders, promoting a child-centred approach prioritizing prevention and early intervention. Benefits include improved investigations, enhanced child protection, increased community trust, and better outcomes for children, families, and communities. Investing in capacity building ensures a safer environment for children, aligns with international standards and best practices in child protection, and supports collaborative efforts with social services.

The project planned and delivered various activities to contribute to this area of study. These activities and accomplishments are described below:

#### Training of police officers/other key stakeholders on child-friendly policing

Sixty police officers enhanced their understanding of the Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act 2015 through a joint training initiative supported by the District Administration, Police Office, and Child Protection Unit in Rajouri. The program, inaugurated by SSP Mr. Amritpal Singh, aimed to sensitize officers on the provisions of the Juvenile Justice Act. Expert resource persons, including Mr. Rajiv Khajuria and Ms Nimisha Srivastava, led the training. The training focused on

- a. Procedures for dealing with Children in Conflict with Law (CCL).
- b. Recording and reporting of juvenile cases.
- c. Role of JJBs and CWC.
- d. Unique needs and vulnerability of children.
- e. Required communication skills & Do's and Don'ts for police officers when dealing with children, and
- f. Collaborative approaches. The platform brought together police, the Child Welfare Committee, the Juvenile Justice Board, and District Child Protection Unit to strengthen child protection mechanisms, focusing on police roles.

The collaborative effort fostered a unified approach to safeguarding children's rights and well-being in the district.





#### **Convergent Workshop to Strengthen the Child Protection Mechanism**

The National Development Foundation (NDF) is committed to safeguarding the rights and well-being of children in Jammu and Kashmir. A one-day convergent workshop was organised in December 2023 to bring together government officials, civil society organisations, and experts in child protection. The workshop aimed to promote a collaborative approach and enhance understanding of the Juvenile Justice Act, Mission Vatsalya, and child rights.

#### **Key Achievements**

- **Enhanced Awareness:** Successfully raised awareness among stakeholders about child rights and protection mechanisms.
- **Strengthened Capacities:** Trained over 100 individuals on the Juvenile Justice Act and child protection principles.
- Improved Collaboration: Fostered collaboration among government agencies, civil society organisations, and communities for effective CPM implementation.
- Advocacy Success: Secured commitments from government officials to strengthen CPM and allocate necessary resources.

The National Development Foundation remains dedicated to safeguarding the rights and well-being of children in Jammu and Kashmir. Through our efforts, we have made significant strides in strengthening the Child Protection Mechanism and creating a more child-friendly environment. We are committed to continuing this work in the coming years to ensure that every child has the opportunity to thrive and reach their full potential.

#### Symposium on Child Rights at Govt. Degree College

NDF, in collaboration with the Directorate of School Education, has organised symposium at Govt. Degree College Darhal, Rajouri district that focused on child rights and are aimed at raising awareness and fostering dialogue among various stakeholders. This Symposium brought together educators, local leaders, parents, and child rights advocates to discuss critical issues affecting children in the community. Topics ranged from the importance of Education and health to combating child labour and ensuring safe environments for all children. Around 200 attendees were sensitised by this symposium program.

The symposium also highlighted the role of legislation and local policies in safeguarding children's welfare. By empowering attendees with knowledge and tools, NDF aims to cultivate a community-wide commitment to uphold and advocate for the rights of children, ensuring that their voices are amplified and their needs are met. The culmination of this event not only fosters a deeper understanding of child rights but also strengthens collaborative efforts to create a more protective environment for children in the region.

## Research Project i.e. Preparation of PRI-based geo-referenced biodiversity assessment, documentation and conservation plan of wild flora and fauna of Kishtwar High Altitude National Park (KHANP)

National Development Foundation continued working on a prestigious project, i.e., preparing a PRI-based geo-referenced biodiversity assessment, documentation, and conservation plan of wild flora and fauna of Kishtwar High Altitude National Park (KHANP). The project is in partnership with the following consortium partners:

- 1. University of Kashmir.
- 2. Central University of Jammu.
- 3. Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU).
- 4. Local stakeholders

The project's primary objective is to document and assess the park's biodiversity, contributing to our understanding of the unique ecosystems thriving in high-altitude regions.

NDF has submitted reports to the Department of Wildlife Protection department, which are appreciated on record by the Hon'ble LG of J&K, among other senior officers.

The NDF research team is focusing on the following aspects of the Kishtwar High Altitude National Park, which are mentioned below.

- 1. Bird Diversity Assessment: The project focuses on identifying and documenting the avian species present within the national park. Bird surveys, including point counts, transects, and mist netting, are being conducted to record species diversity, population sizes and migratory patterns. The collected data will contribute to understanding the park's role in avian conservation and migration.
- 2. Mammal Species Inventory: The research project aims to establish a comprehensive inventory of mammalian species inhabiting the Kishtwar High Altitude National Park. Field surveys, camera trapping, and DNA analysis techniques are being employed to identify and document mammal species, their population densities and habitat preferences.
- **3. Flora Composition and Distribution:** The study involves comprehensive vegetation surveys across different habitats within the park. Botanical techniques such as transect sampling, quadrat analysis and species identification are being utilised to determine the diversity, distribution and abundance of plant species. The collected data will aid in understanding the park's ecological processes, plant community dynamics and potential threats to vegetation.
- **4. Insect Biodiversity Assessment:** The project includes an assessment of insect biodiversity within the park. Various sampling techniques, such as sweep netting, pitfall traps, and light trapping, are employed to capture and identify insect species. This research will contribute to knowledge of insect communities, their ecological roles and potential indicators of environmental change.

Conservation implications of Kishtwar Project: Presently, the field research team based at the research station at Loharna in the Dacchan area of Kishtwar is collecting all the research data. This collected data will undergo rigorous analysis to determine species richness, abundance, and diversity indices. Statistical models and Geographic Information Systems (GIS) will be utilised to understand the spatial distribution patterns of the studied taxa. The research findings will provide valuable insights into the ecological health of the Kishtwar High Altitude National Park and will aid in formulating conservation strategies to safeguard its biodiversity. The final DPR of the project will have all the information about various ecological aspects of the park and will have specific recommendations for the conservation and management of the park.

Education, Awareness and Capacity Building: Simultaneously, along with research in the park, in order to build capacity for the future, the field researchers regularly visit the local educational institutions and conduct various education and awareness programmes related to the wildlife of Kishtwar High Altitude National Park. In order to build the capacity of the frontline staff of the National Park, the local staff actively participates in various research activities being conducted in the area. This will ensure the future sustainability of the ongoing research activities at Kishtwar High Altitude National Park.

#### **Snow Leopard Conservation Programme**

Snow Leopard Panthera uncia, the smallest member of the genus Panthera, is the most elusive cat inhabiting cold and rugged mountain landscapes of the Great and Trans Himalayas in the western Himalayas. Its secretive behaviour, camouflage, and adaption to extreme environmental conditions make it one of the most charismatic species in the world. The snow leopard is found across the high mountains of twelve countries in South and Central Asia, and India has the third largest share of the snow leopard distribution range. In India, the snow leopard is found in the Union territories of Ladakh and Jammu & Kashmir, the states of Uttrakhand and Himachal Pradesh in the Western Himalayas and the states of Arunachal Pradesh and Sikkim in the Eastern Himalayas. However, currently, the species is facing various threats, such as habitat loss, poaching and human-wildlife conflict.

Through our snow leopard research and conservation programme, the National Development Foundation (NDF) is dedicated to safeguarding the snow leopard population and preserving their unique habitat in the Himalayan landscape.

At NDF, we have embarked on a comprehensive research and conservation initiative with support from the Department of Wildlife Protection and the Government of J&K. This programme has a special focus on protecting the snow leopard and its fragile habitats. Currently, our programme is focusing on the following key areas:

**1.Research:** As part of our research activities for snow leopards, we conduct extensive field research to understand the behaviour, ecology and population dynamics of snow leopards at Kishtwar High Altitude National Park. Through camera trapping, satellite tracking, and genetic analysis, we gather crucial data to inform our conservation strategies.





- **2. Community Engagement:** We recognise the importance of involving local communities in conservation efforts. Therefore, NDF community experts work closely with villagers, herders and other stakeholders to raise awareness about the importance of snow leopards and mitigate human-wildlife conflicts through innovative solutions.
- **3. Habitat Protection:** Preserving the snow leopard's habitat is essential for their long-term survival. We collaborate with government agencies and local authorities to implement land-use planning measures and promote sustainable land management practices.
- **4. Capacity Building:** We train local researchers, conservationists and wildlife officials to enhance their skills in snow leopard monitoring, research techniques and community outreach. By empowering local stakeholders, we ensure the sustainability of our conservation efforts.
- **5. Advocacy and Policy:** We advocate for stronger legal protection and policies to safeguard snow leopards and their habitat. Through partnerships with national and international organisations, we strive to influence policy decisions and secure funding for conservation initiatives.

#### **Our impact:**

Since the inception of our project, we have made significant progress in snow leopard conservation in Jammu & Kashmir. Our field team at Kishtwar High Altitude National Park is the first to provide photographic evidence about the presence of snow leopards in the area. Currently, this project is being implemented in partnership with the Department of Wildlife Protection and the Government of J&K. At the same time, by collaborating with local communities and universities, we have increased awareness about the importance of preserving this iconic species.
